## About This Series

This six-lesson series by Keith Blades examines the doctrine of positional truth — our identification in the Lord Jesus Christ. Beginning with a thorough portrait of our former offensive identification in Adam (condemnation, abomination, and alienation), Keith contrasts it with the glorious new identification every believer receives the moment they trust Christ as Savior. Through the Spirit’s baptism into Christ, we have been made the righteousness of God in Christ (justification), the holiness of God in Christ (sanctification), and the glory of God in Christ (exaltation). The series concludes by surveying key exhortation passages from Romans through Philemon, demonstrating that the key to successfully living the Christian life is knowing who God has made us to be in Christ and responding to the details of life accordingly.

## Lesson Summaries

## L1

### **Introducing Our Identification in Christ** *Laying the Foundations of Positional Truth*

- "As many as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ" — salvation gives us a new identification in him, not merely forgiveness of sins (Galatians 3:26-28)
- The key to living the Christian life: knowing who God has made you to be in Christ and responding to the details of life accordingly
- The expression "in Christ" permeates Paul's epistles — justification, sanctification, and exaltation are all positional realities grounded in this identification
- Survey of key "in Christ" passages: Romans 6; 12:4-5; 1 Corinthians 1:2, 30; Ephesians 1:3, 6-7; 2:10; 5:8; Colossians 2:8-12
- Our former identification in Adam provides the essential backdrop that magnifies the grandeur of our new identity in Christ

#### **Three major components of our former offensive identification in Adam:**

- Condemnation — under sin, no righteousness, enemies of God (Romans 1:18–32; 2:1–3:20; 5:10)
- Abomination — servants of sin, dead to righteousness, following the course of this world (introduced)
- Alienation — dead Gentiles, belonging to Satan, citizens of his kingdom (introduced)
- Understanding condemnation: we were sinners by nature with no righteousness to offer and functionally enemies of God

## L2

### **Completing the Picture — Our Former Identity in Adam**

*Abomination, Alienation, and the Baptism That Changes Everything*

- Review: three aspects of Condemnation — under sin, no righteousness, enemies of God

#### **Three aspects of Abomination in Adam (Romans 6:20; Ephesians 2:1-3):**

- Servants of sin — not merely under sin's guilt but actively in its service
- Dead to righteousness — even our best works were as filthy rags (Isaiah 64:6; Philippians 3)
- Following the course of this world — laboring to the honor and glory of the Adversary

#### **Three aspects of Alienation in Adam (Ephesians 2:11-12; Colossians 1:13):**

- Dead as Gentiles in the flesh — doubly alienated: as sons of Adam and as uncircumcision
- Belonging to Satan — the kingdoms of this world were delivered to him (Luke 4:5-6)
- Good citizens of his kingdom — following the course he charted, bringing him glory
- The mechanical means of our new identification: the Holy Spirit baptizing us into Christ — not water baptism (Romans 6:3; 1 Corinthians 12:13; Galatians 3:27; Colossians 2:11-12)
- A baptism is always a purification unto sanctification and a new identification; the Spirit's baptism washes us from all former offensive identity in Adam

#### **The three corresponding contrasts:**

- Condemnation → Justification (made the righteousness of God in Christ)

- Abomination → Sanctification (made the holiness of God in Christ)
- Alienation → Exaltation (made the glory of God in Christ)

## L3

### **Our Glorious New Identity — Justification in Christ** *Made the Righteousness of God in Christ*

- 1 Corinthians 6:9-11 provides the clearest summary: the monikers of unrighteousness are past tense; “ye are washed, sanctified, justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God”
- The moniker of unrighteousness: God’s justice could designate each sinner in Adam by the dominant affection of their sin nature (fornicator, drunkard, thief, etc.) — all past tense at salvation
- Three major components to our new identity in Christ: Justification (J), Sanctification (S), and Exaltation (E) — all are “in him” (2 Corinthians 5:21)
- Why the Corinthians had not yet been taught exaltation: they were still “babes in Christ” and could only receive milk, not the meat of the wisdom of God in the mystery (1 Corinthians 2:6-7; 3:1-2)

#### **Three aspects of Justification — made the righteousness of God in Christ:**

- Forgiveness of ALL sins — past, present, and future; no repeated forgiveness needed (Colossians 2:13; Titus 2:14)
- Imputation of Christ’s righteousness — God’s justice counts us as righteous in him (Romans 3:21-26; 2 Corinthians 5:21)
- Permanent reconciliation — we are permanently at-one with God; no longer enemies but in peace (Romans 5:1, 10-11)
- Romans 5:1: “Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ” — condemnation is completely gone

## L4

### **Sanctification and Exaltation in Christ** *Made the Holiness and the Glory of God in Christ*

- Sanctification = made the holiness of God in Christ; we can now bring forth fruit unto holiness that God’s justice fully accepts (Romans 6:22; 1 Thessalonians 4:7)
- God did not only justify us — he sanctified us; the reason to live a godly life is NOT to maintain justification but because God has made us holy unto himself

#### **Three aspects of Sanctification — made the holiness of God in Christ:**

- Dead to sin — freed from sin’s mastership and dominion; an emancipation from its reign (Romans 6:2, 6-7, 11)
- Alive unto God — can now yield members as instruments of righteousness; fruit unto holiness (Romans 6:11-13, 22)
- Sonship status — God treats us as sons led by his Spirit; the privilege of laboring with him (Romans 8:14-15; Galatians 4)
- The “but now” formula: Romans 3:21 (condemnation → justification); Romans 6:22 (abomination → sanctification); Ephesians 2:4 (alienation → exaltation)
- Exaltation = made the glory of God in Christ; raised up and made to sit together in heavenly places in Christ (Ephesians 2:4-6)

#### **Three aspects of Exaltation — made the glory of God in Christ:**

- Part of the one new man — a new species of humanity fit for heavenly places, no longer dead Gentiles (Ephesians 2:13-15)

- Delivered from Satan; translated into the kingdom of Christ — new citizenship, new ownership (Colossians 1:12-13)
- Heavenly vocation — blessed with all spiritual blessings; making an impact on principalities and powers (Ephesians 1:3; 3:9-11; 4:1)

## L5

### **Grace, Law, and Walking After the Spirit** *The Power Source for Living the Christian Life*

- “Sin shall not have dominion over you: for ye are not under law, but under grace” — the basis of our walk is our position in Christ under grace, not personal performance (Romans 6:14)
- The law is an IF/THEN performance system: it manifests the human impossibility of self-justification, sanctification, or exaltation (Deuteronomy 6:24-25; Leviticus 18:5; Exodus 19:5-6; Deuteronomy 28)
- The law was designed to put sin into motion and prove that condemnation, abomination, and alienation are our natural Adam-identification — Israel had to learn this the hard way
- God made us dead to the law so we can serve “in the newness of spirit, and not in the oldness of the letter” (Romans 7:6)
- The most foolish thing a Christian can do is try to live the Christian life through a performance system — law-keeping or any self-made equivalent produces the “wretched man” of Romans 7
- Walking after the Spirit = being mindful of what the Holy Spirit has made you to be in Christ (Romans 8:1-6)
  - To be spiritually minded is life and peace (Romans 8:6)
  - “Walk in the Spirit and ye shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh” (Galatians 5:16)
- The doctrine of our identity in Christ is alive and powerful; as we believe it and are mindful of it, it effectually works within us to put our position into practice
- Grace gave us perfect justification, sanctification, and exaltation as a gift at salvation — grace says “you’ve got it; now walk worthy of it”

## L6

### **Living Consistent With Who We Are in Christ** *Exhortation* *Passages: Walking Worthy of Our Identity*

- Romans 12:1-2 — “I beseech you by the mercies of God”: present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable — that is your “reasonable service” in light of justification, sanctification, and exaltation
- The exhortations of Romans through Philemon are not law-based commands but appeals grounded in what God has already made us to be in Christ
- Romans 13:14 — “Put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ”: the power to make no provision for the flesh is clothing yourself with your identity in Christ, not gritting your teeth under a performance system
- 1 Corinthians 6:11 — “Such were some of you: but ye are washed, sanctified, justified”: Paul confronts inconsistent conduct by reminding saints of who they now are
- 2 Corinthians 7:9-11 — Godly sorrow worked repentance: when the Corinthians saw their conduct through the eyes of their identity in Christ, they

were made sorry after a godly manner

- Galatians 5:13-18 — “Ye have been called unto liberty”: walking in the Spirit produces what the law never could — freedom from fulfilling the lusts of the flesh
- Ephesians 4:17-24; 5:1-11 — Put off the old man; put on the new man created in righteousness and true holiness; “ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord”
- Colossians 3:1-14 — Set affections on things above; “Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved” — a wardrobe that matches our identity
- Titus 2:11-14; 3:3-8 — Grace teaches us to deny ungodliness; Christ gave himself to redeem us from all iniquity and purify a peculiar people zealous of good works
- The doctrine of who we are in Christ is the only power sufficient to effectually produce the Christian life — affirm it constantly (Titus 3:8)

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## Key Doctrinal Distinctions

### In Adam vs. In Christ

Every person born into the world possesses a natural identification in Adam characterized by condemnation (under sin, no righteousness, enemies of God), abomination (servants of sin, dead to righteousness, following the course of this world), and alienation (dead Gentiles, belonging to Satan, citizens of his kingdom). The moment a person trusts the Lord Jesus Christ as Savior, the Holy Spirit baptizes them out of that offensive identification and into Christ, giving them justification (the righteousness of God in Christ), sanctification (the holiness of God in Christ), and exaltation (the glory of God in Christ). These are not descriptions of behavior but of position — every believer possesses all three from the moment of salvation.

### Dead IN Sin vs. Dead TO Sin

Being dead “in” trespasses and sins describes our former hopeless condition as sons of Adam — spiritually dead, incapable of producing what God’s justice requires (Ephesians 2:1). Being dead “to” sin describes our sanctified position in Christ — the Holy Spirit’s baptism into Christ’s death, burial, and resurrection has freed us from sin’s dominion so that we no longer must obey its lusts (Romans 6:2, 11). Confusing these two expressions leads to misunderstanding both the nature of salvation and the basis for the Christian walk.

### The Law System vs. Grace

The law is an IF/THEN performance system designed to manifest that justification, sanctification, and exaltation are humanly unattainable. It was never intended to provide these things but to prove the necessity of grace. Grace, by contrast, freely gives all three to the believer at the moment of faith in Christ. A Christian who attempts to live the Christian life through law-keeping — whether the Mosaic law or a self-made equivalent — is walking after the flesh and will produce exactly what the law was

designed to produce: the conviction that the flesh cannot please God. The power to live the Christian life is the doctrine of who we are in Christ under grace.

## Walking After the Flesh vs. Walking After the Spirit

Walking “after the flesh” means operating on a performance system — whether the Mosaic law or a self-made equivalent. Walking “after the Spirit” means being mindful of what the Holy Spirit has made us to be in Christ: dead to sin, alive unto God, seated in heavenly places. As Paul writes in Romans 8:5, “they that are after the Spirit mind the things of the Spirit.” This mindfulness — reckoning ourselves to be who God says we are in Christ — is the key to not fulfilling the lust of the flesh and to bringing forth fruit unto holiness.

## Justification, Sanctification, and Exaltation: Three Inseparable Components

These three form the complete picture of our identity in Christ. Justification makes us the righteousness of God in Christ — we will live forever with God. Sanctification makes us the holiness of God in Christ — we can live unto God now, bringing forth fruit he accepts. Exaltation makes us the glory of God in Christ — we can live for God’s honor and glory right now, making an impact in connection with his heavenly purposes. Understanding all three aspects is essential to fully appreciating our identity and to walking in a manner worthy of our calling.

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## Key Scripture References

<b>Galatians 3:26-28</b>	Baptized into Christ; “have put on Christ” — the new identification supplants all former fleshly identities
<b>Romans 3:21-26</b>	The righteousness of God by faith, freely offered to all who believe; God is just and the justifier
<b>Romans 5:1, 10-11</b>	Justified by faith; peace with God; permanent reconciliation — no longer enemies but at-one with God
<b>Romans 6:2-14</b>	Dead to sin; alive unto God; not under law but under grace — the doctrine of sanctification

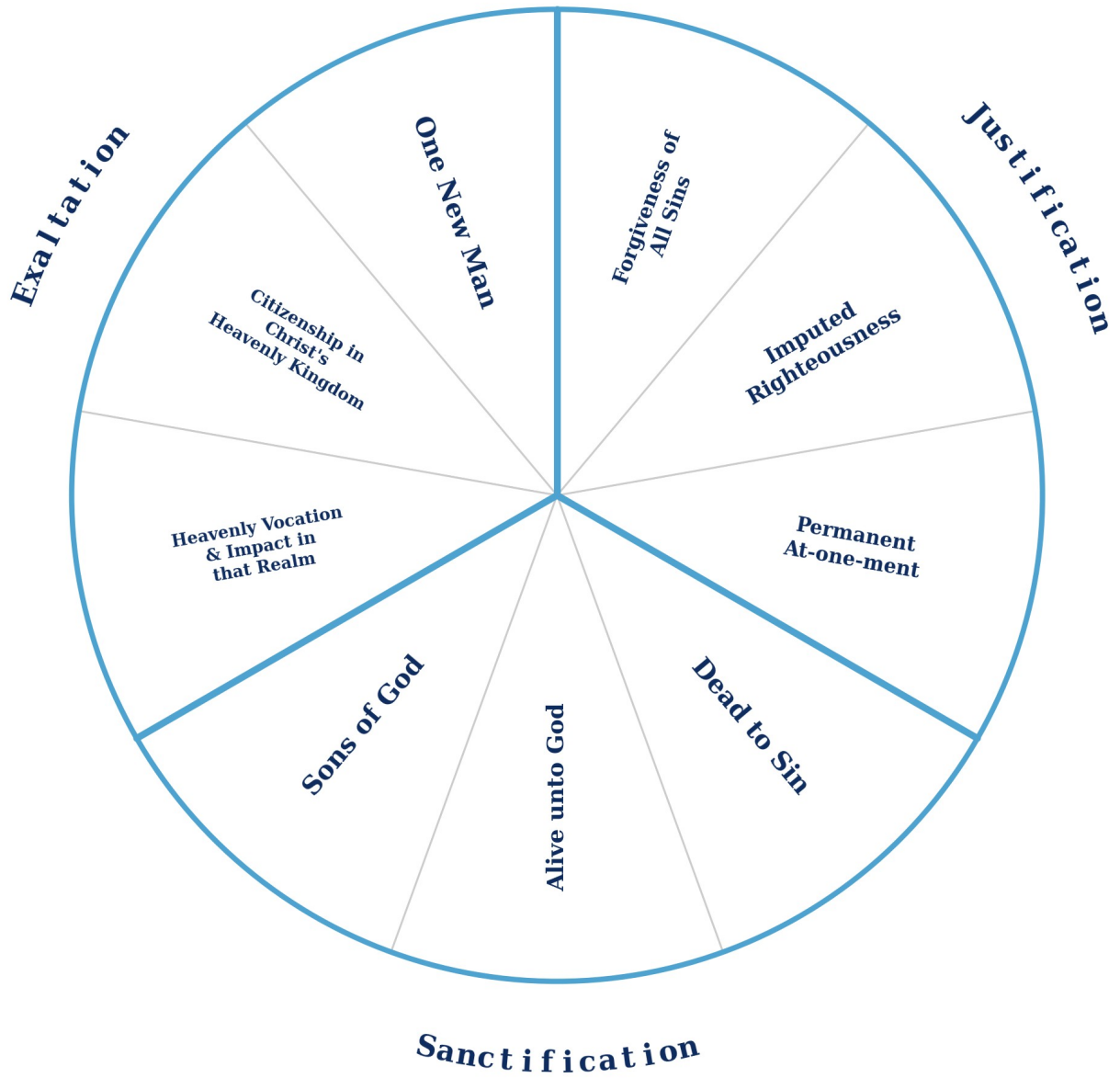
